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**Subject:** Full-year Transfers to UC and CSU, 2012-13 to 2014-15

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This report reflects data for full-year transfers to the University of California and California State University between 2012-13 and 2014-15. Since 2013-14 is the most recent data from the state Chancellor's Office, in-state private institutions and out-of-state institutions data reflects the most recent three years, 2011-12 to 2013-14.

## Transfers to University of California (UC)

### *Admission & Enrollment*

- In 2014-15, the number of De Anza students who applied to a UC is 1,418
- 75% of De Anza students who applied to a UC were admitted
- 77% of De Anza students were admitted to a UC

### *GPA by UC Campus*

- In 2014-15, De Anza students' enrollment GPA across the nine UC campuses ranged between 3.81 to 2.86

### Transfers by UC Campus

- Percent change year over year
  - Between 2011-12 and 2012-13, transfers to UC declined by 77 students or 10%  
*For reference, transfers to UC in 2011-12 totaled 804 students*
  - Between 2012-13 and 2013-14, transfers to UC increased by 4%
  - Between 2013-14 and 2014-15, transfers to UC increased by 8%
- Three-year change
  - Over the past three years, 2012-13 to 2014-15, transfers to UC increased by 12%
  - The UC campuses that saw the largest change in transfer increases were:
    - UC Riverside (increased by 92%)
    - UC Irvine (increased by 43%)
    - UC San Diego (increased 27%)
- In 2014-15, the UC campuses with the highest number of De Anza transferred students included:
  - UC Davis (24% of all transfers)
  - UC San Diego (20% of all transfers)
  - UC Berkeley (16% of all transfers)

\*Starting in 2014-15, schools with fewer than five applicants and fewer than three admits or enrollees do not have data and are denoted as "NA." Therefore, summing the student count by campus will not total the universitywide count (aggregate count). For this reason, the figures reflected in the "total" row are the actual universitywide aggregate count of enrollees.

### ***Transfers by Ethnicity***

*Note: Percent change is not provided in table 4 since the University of California does not provide data on transfer by ethnicity (i.e. disaggregate level) when the number of applicants, admits and enrollees by ethnicity is fewer than five applicants.*

- In 2014-15, Asian and international students accounted for the majority of De Anza students who applied to a UC, 44% and 29%, respectively
  - Nearly 75% or more of domestic ethnicity unknown, international and Asian students who applied to a UC were admitted; and at least 75% of these admitted students enrolled
  - At least 67% of American Indian, Latino/a and White students who applied to a UC were admitted; and 75% of these admitted students enrolled
  - 50% of African American students who applied to a UC were admitted, and 59% of them enrolled

## Transfers to California State University (CSU)

### Transfers by CSU Campus

- Percent change year over year
  - In 2012-13, transfers to CSU resulted in 117 fewer students compared to the previous year, or a 9% decrease in transfer  
*For reference, transfers to CSU in 2011-12 totaled 1,342 students*
  - Between 2012-13 and 2013-14, transfers to CSU increased by 171 students or 14%
  - Between 2013-14 and 2014-15, transfers to CSU decreased by 61 students or 4%
- In 2014-15, the CSU campuses with the highest number of De Anza transfer students are San Jose State (831), San Francisco State (169) and East Bay (122); and this is consistent with previous yearly trend
- Over the past three years, 2012-13 to 2014-15, overall transfers to CSU increased by 9%

\*In 2011-12, San Jose State University made changes to its admissions procedures. All majors were declared "impacted" and applicants were ranked by GPA. As a result, students competed for available spots within each impacted major.

### ***Transfers by Ethnicity***

- In 2014-15, Asian (42%) and Latino/a (20%) students comprised more than half of all racial/ethnic subgroups who transferred to a CSU; and this trend is consistent with previous yearly trends
- Over the past three years, 2012-13 to 2014-15, the largest gains in transfer to a CSU is observed among De Anza's African American students with an increase of 56% (despite accounting for fewer than 5% of CSU transfers on an annual basis). Latino/a students had the second largest gain with a 47% increase in CSU transfers over the three-year period.

### ***Transfers to In-State Private and Out-of-State Institutions***

*Note: 2013-14 is the most recent data from the state Chancellor's Office.*

- In 2013-14, among De Anza students who transferred to an in-state private or out-of-state institution, the majority of them opted for an out-of-state institution (53%). This is a reverse in trend from the previous years where most students transferred to an in-state private institution.
- Over the past three years, 2011-12 to 2013-14, transfers to in-state private institutions declined by nearly 20%, whereas transfers to out-of-state institutions remained unchanged.
