COURSE DESCRIPTION:

ESL 273/473 is an advanced level course which introduces the principles and techniques of academic writing based on critical reading and thinking. ESL 273.52Z /473.52Z is a fully asynchronous class with no required meetings.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- A.** Write well-developed essays that analyze and synthesize main ideas and differing viewpoints from a variety of academic reading materials.
- B.** Demonstrate level-specific grammar, sentence structures, and vocabulary in writing.
- C.** Evaluate own writing for rhetorical structure and clarity by means of revision and editing.

REQUIRED MATERIALS:

Great Writing 4 by Folse and Vestri

PREREQUISITE:

ESL 261 and ESL 265, or ESL 461 and ESL 465, with a grade of C or better or qualifying placement

GRADING GUIDELINES:

Your grade will be based on the following:

1. Academic Essays	30%	90-100%= A
2. Writing Exams	35%	80-89%= B
3. Final Reflective Essay Exam	10%	70-79%= C
4. Quizzes	10%	65-69%= D
5. Discussion Posts	15%	0-64%= F

ESSAY ASSIGNMENTS:

All essays must be typed, double-spaced, and submitted to turnitin through Canvas.

WRITING EXAMS AND QUIZZES:

No make-up exams or quizzes will be given unless documentation for an emergency is provided.

ASSIGNMENTS POLICY:

You are required to complete all assignments by the due date. Ten percent will be deducted for each day an assignment is submitted late. Submissions will not be accepted more than two days late. All rough drafts must be submitted on time to be evaluated.

ESSAY REQUIREMENTS

- Essay Length: Each essay needs to include a minimum of four-five paragraphs with an introduction, body paragraphs, and a conclusion. All essays need to be approximately 800-1000 words in length.
- Format: All essays need to be double spaced in 12 font and include a Works Cited page listing the sources used in MLA format. Indent each paragraph and use one- inch margins for each assignment.

PORTFOLIO

These are the two criteria for passing the class.

1. a score of 70% or better on the coursework
2. a passing portfolio

All portfolios must include:

- One drafted essay (revised) – five paragraphs, about 1000 words
- One writing exam (may **not** be revised) – four paragraphs, about 800 words
- One reflective essay (not revised by instructor) five paragraphs, 1000 words

ATTENDANCE/DROP POLICY:

Online attendance is not marked by your physical presence in a classroom but by participation and engagement with the course activities and assignments. Submit work regularly to show your active attendance. If you do not submit assignments for two modules in a row, you may be dropped for non-participation.

CHEATING AND PLAGIARISM:

Plagiarism is presenting another's work as your own or copying sentences, phrases, or passages from a source without crediting the author. Using any form of AI or machine translation such as google translate to compose assignments is not allowed. Anyone engaging in cheating or plagiarism in any form will receive no credit for the assignment or exam.
